Just as we cannot imagine our state without lakes and rivers, we also would not recognize a year without cold winter nights, heavy snow, summertime thunderstorms, or numerous warm and sunny days. Minnesotans depend on both climate and water for our way of life, from recreation like hunting, fishing and paddling, to our agricultural, tourism and industrial economies.
